- A battery of emf 10 V and internal resistance 3 Ω is connected to a 3.2 resistor. If the current in the circuit is 0.5 A, what is the resistance of the resistor? What is the terminal voltage of the battery when the circuit is closed?
- (a) Three resistors 1 Ω, 2 Ω, and 3 Ω are combined in series. What is the total resistance of the combination?
 (b) If the combination is connected to a battery of emf 12 V and 3.3



The potential difference of 400 kV between the top of the atmosphere and the surface results (due to the low conductivity of the lower atmosphere in a current of only 1800 A over the entire globe. If there were no mechanism of sustaining atmospheric electric field, how much time (roughly) would be required to neutralise the earth's surface? (This never happens in practice because there is a mechanism to replenish electric charges, namely the continual thunderstorms and lightning in different parts of the globe). (Radius of earth = 6.37×10^{6} m.)
- (a) Six lead-acid type of secondary cells each of emf 2.0 V and internal 3.15 resistance 0.015Ω are joined in series to provide a supply to a * resistance of $8.5~\Omega$. What are the current drawn from the supply and its terminal voltage?
 - (b) A secondary cell after long use has an emf of 1.9 V and a large internal resistance of 380 Ω . What maximum current can be drawn from the cell? Could the cell drive the starting motor of a car?
- Two wires of equal length, one of aluminium and the other of copper 3.16 have the same resistance. Which of the two wires is lighter? 





Figure 3.33 shows a potentiometer with a cell of 2.0 V and internal resistance 0.40 Ω maintaining a potential drop across the resistor wire AB. A standard cell which maintains a constant emf of 1.02 V (for very moderate currents upto a few mA) gives a balance point at 67.3 cm length of the wire. To ensure very low currents drawn from the standard cell, a very high resistance of 600 k Ω is put in series with it, which is shorted close to the balance point. The standard cell is then replaced by a cell of unknown emf ε and the balance






FIGURE 3.35
